How Our Scholarships Help

he Breakfast Rotary contributes scholarships annually to qualifying students at Eastern Maine Community College. This morning, three recipients told how the funding is affecting their lives and helping them achieve their educational goals.

Jennifer Khavari introduced the students, noting that the college receives about \$110,000 each year for scholarships, ten percent of which comes from the Breakfast Rotary. The scholarship committee chooses ten applicants to receive the scholarships. "We touch the lives of people everyday, even if it's a greeting or handshake. Handing them a check means even more," she said. "We look for students who want to give back to their community."

Kerri Davis, who plans to pursue an automotive career with a goal of eventual promotion to service writer/advisor, told us "I cannot put into words what this scholarship means to me." Ms. Davis echoes what previous scholarship recipients have said, that she balances many activities in long days (up at 5:30 am to get the kids ready for school, and

after she returns home at 6:30 pm, helps them with their homework), Also factor in studies at EMCC and a part-time job. Her scholarship money allowed her to purchase her own tools.

Amanda Wilson is in EMCC's Secondary Education Program and plans to attend the University of Maine with a graduation date in 2021. "I am trying to balance being a mother, a wife, a student and a teacher.

Jeremy Cole said that although he has five children, the Electrical and Automation Program student is able to

focus more intently on his schooling because of the scholarship. He is an officer in Phi Beta Kappa and a Master Electrician. He plans further study at UMaine.

Jennifer invited those who are interested to work with the EMCC Foundation, especially in reviewing the large number of scholarship applications the college receives. June Kontio and **Kendra Speed** are members.

We welcomed EMCC visitors Terry Adam and Carol Lewandowski who helped with the scholarship sorting and choosing.


A Rotary Moment from **Ken Huhn** highlighted "People of Action Around the Globe," published in the latest issue of The Rotarian.
