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## Breaking the Cycle

yler Oversmith brought The Power of Possible to today's meeting. That power lodges in Fedcap, its Breaking the Cycle program that was officially launched in Maine with the opening of four Opportunity Centers.

Fedcap established the Breaking the Cycle program after Maine officials selected it to provide statewide services under the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program, called ASPIRE. The state had not met TANF work participation rates and believed Fedcap could do a better job. There are approximately 3000 TANF cases throughout Maine, and the state is committed to working with Fedcap

to end poverty for these individuals, families and children.

Fedcap provides education and training that leads to sustainable employment, as well as connections to services for those with barriers to work.

Mr. Oversmith cited the low unemployment rate in Maine, and invited employers to contact him about possible well-trained individuals suitable for hiring.

The Breaking the Cycle program operates out of 16 Opportunity Centers. The four Centers are located in South Portland, Sanford, Lewiston and

Skowhegan. The 12 remaining Opportunity Centers opened their doors on February 6th. A team of 145 employees will serve TANF families. A new proprietary case management system, FedcapCARES, will track Fedcap's performance for the state. The six-year, \$62 million contract marks the first time the State of Maine has contracted for management of its entire TANF program.

The Breaking the Cycle program commences with the state's TANF workforce participation rate at 16 percent. Fedcap's goal is a participation rate of 50 percent within 18 months. TANF has a five-year cash limit, so it is critical that recipients work to replace that income when the TANF funds stop.



"We help people navigate the employment process," Mr. Oversmith said. "We advise what to say in a job interview, what not to say, resume preparation, writing the cover letter and a thank-you letter."
