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## **The Color Purple**

cott Boucher reprised his Purple Pinky presentation for the club today. As Maine's ambassador for spreading the word about Rotary's Polio Plus campaign, he reviewed and updated the worldwide status of the disease.

In addition to noting World Polio Day was October 24, his statistics revealed that, unlike smallpox eradication, work remains to eliminate polio.

"The Purple Pinky Project is unique to our area," he said. The purple dye was first used to indicate children who had received the polio vaccination to prevent double

inoculations. The indicator helped spread the word about Polio Plus.

"I was in Best Buy and I had purple on my pinky," Scott said. "The 19-year-old clerk who asked me about it gave me a chance to tell her about Polio Plus. She pulled out her wallet and made a donation."

Among other sources, the polio virus is found in sewage. Children can contract it by playing in water. The spread of polio "is just a plane ride away" when families travel.

The Bangor Breakfast, Bangor Noon – of which Scott is a member – and the Old Town Rotary clubs work collaboratively to promote Polio Plus. Scott congratulated the Breakfast Rotary for contributing the most money in the district last year to the project. He praised the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation for its 2:1 matching dollar funding.

In third world countries, vaccination resistance prevents children from getting the needed polio protection, but Rotary has helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children against polio in 122 countries. A child can be protected against this crippling disease for life for as little as \$0.60.

There have been some false alarms about polio cases. Scott mentioned a Minnesota case of acute flaccid myelitis, a rare condition that affects the nerves in the spinal cord. Like polio, it can cause sudden weakness in the arms or legs and other symptoms. It tends to happen mainly in children. The condition may have various causes. Infection with

viruses such as adenovirus, poliovirus, other enteroviruses and West Nile virus may precede it. Acute flaccid myelitis may be treated by doctors trained in nervous system conditions. According to the Mayo Clinic, therapies specifically for acute flaccid myelitis aren't available, but doctors may suggest physical and occupational therapy to help improve weakness in the arms and legs. To prevent acute flaccid myelitis, it may help to get a child vaccinated against poliovirus.

"We're at 99 percent in eliminating polio," Scott said. "That's not good enough."
