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Webb Weaves Project-Based Learning Children are more than a test score

personal learning style is like those 'lost boys.' I learn by doing." Telling how she best learns, Dr. Betsy Webb, Superintendent of the Bangor School System, has been an educator for 35 years. Introduced by Lisa Larson, she told, at Thursday's meeting about the discovery of the huge number of young men ages 20-35 – the "lost boys" - who are not in the Maine work

force nor are they seeking work. At what age does a school student begin to realize that he - or she - will "drop out"?

That student is usually in the 4th grade, said Dr. Webb, "and by the 7th grade will begin dropping out. They miss fifty to sixty school days a year, and we're in school for only 180 days."

A major initiative to reduce the dropout syndrome and guide students toward staying in school is the Southern Penobscot Regional Program for Children with Exceptionalities. SPRPCE is committed to the concept of providing a free appropriate public education to all children in the least restrictive environment.

Twenty-five students in the program show up every day and engage in hands-on learning in

wide-ranging courses including electricity, sound and light wave experiments, music lab featuring piano or guitar and one-act plays. Hosted by Eastern Maine Community College, SPRPCE gives students a good academic background that they carry to United Technologies Center and to EMCC. They may go on to earn a bachelor's degree.

"Public education is losing funding at a time when we need to expand," Dr. Webb said. She said also that there is a national shortage for teachers who are trained in the

special education field. Dr. Webb started her career in alterative education as a teacher. "We have to show trust. We can bend, but we don't break."

Students who apply for the SPRPCE program do not need to take entrance exams. To identify those who would most benefit from the program, their experiences in school are examined, and they job-shadow. Twenty-three Maine school districts now have special education programs.

Dr. Webb gave information also about the Maine College and Career Ready Framework that gives the pathways for the Distinguished Scholar Designation.

"Children are more than a test score," Dr. Webb said.
